"You may be the only Bible that some person ever reads"

This quote is generally attributed to William Thoms who lived in the 17th Century, but is also true for us today. As our society today tries to release itself from the grip of a global pandemic, many people are more interested in what our church has to say than ever before. For many people, the first Bible that they read will be us.

The full version of this quote is, "Be careful how you live. You may be the only Bible some person ever reads." In today's post-modern culture, it is true that people look at the way we do things and the way we are long before they will show any interest in what we are doing or why we are doing it. In a media driven society where things are often not what they seem, people are craving integrity and authenticity. This integrity and authenticity is so often lacking in our culture today, but we hope and pray that it will be found in our church, and in us. If people are going to find integrity and authenticity in us individually and corporately, and if they are going to be inspired to pick up the actual Bible, "our discipleship needs to include a radical re-entering into the life, teachings and ministry of Jesus" (to quote Andy Glover again. Andy heads up Fresh Streams).

In our current series we are studying the gospels — seeking to become more like Jesus. We are shifting our emphasis from "what would Jesus do" to "who would Jesus be". Ensuring that we seek to be like Jesus in our character as well as seeking to imitate his activities. Of course, both being and doing feed into each other and facilitate holistic growth in faith. Being and doing are both necessary and are like parallel train tracks. Both sides need to be laid down for the train of discipleship to be able to continue on powered by the steam of the Holy Spirit.

Claire Bedford serving with BMS in Chad

BMS world mission

Claire Bedford has been in N'Djamena in Chad, West Africa since January 2016, following a year of French language study in France. Claire is working for BMS at Guinebor II hospital.



In the UK Claire worked as a hospital pharmacist and latterly as a prescribing advisor for GP practices.

Claire's role in Chad is to continue the development of the pharmacy service at Guinebor II hospital, which is primarily a maternity hospital. As well as having supervisory oversight of the pharmacy and the lab, Claire has been doing some administrative tasks alongside the Chadian administrator and another long-term mission worker. Claire has also been involved in overseeing building projects.

The working language of the hospital, between the staff, is French. However, not many Chadians speak French. In order to be able to interact directly with the patients, Claire has been trying to learn to speak Chadian Arabic.

Claire reports that the hospital is currently extremely busy, more so than usual, due to staff at the government hospitals being on strike over pay. Cases of Covid in Chad remain relatively low but have slowly crept up over the past month or so. An Ethiopian mission worker at the hospital recently shared an update of his team's work in the hospital and surrounding community. Exciting things are happening, many people are enquiring about their faith and there are increasing numbers of people coming to faith. It is exciting that there are people trusting in Jesus as their Saviour, but it is often not without challenge and persecution if they 'go public'.

Claire came back to Devon for Christmas with her family, but due to Covid-related travel restrictions has not yet been able to return to Chad. She is supporting the Senior Management Team at Guinebor II Hospital as much as she can remotely, and is continuing to learn Chadian Arabic.

Claire has sent us the following prayer points:

- That Covid numbers will remain low in Chad and the government will have wisdom in managing Covid, including in deciding when to allow travel into Chad from the UK
- Energy, stamina and wisdom for the Senior Management Team and hospital staff team as they manage the increasing numbers of patients coming through the doors
- That Claire will have an increasingly good grasp of Chadian Arabic
- Patience as Claire waits in the UK while really desiring to be back in Chad
- The chaplaincy team and others at the hospital as they speak to people about Jesus and that wise counsel will be given to those who accept Christ.
